SERMONNOTES

"ONE, ONE, ONE"

LUKE 15:1-7

In Jesus' first sermon, He said, "The kingdom of God is near. Repent and believe the good news" (Mark 1:15, NIV). When people think "repentance," they often think it means "turn or burn" or stopping wrong actions. But the Greek word for repentance — metanoia — means to change your mind. It means to turn around or do a 180, but it always carries the connotation that it's something that we do on our own. We have to figure it out on our own, turn ourselves around on our own, start back to the Father on our own. But what if we have been thinking about repentance wrong? What if we have been using a Western mindset of working hard and pulling ourselves up by our bootstraps rather than believing Jesus' interpretation of what it means to repent?

We need to set aside our Western mindset and try to understand a first-century, Middle Eastern mentality because that is the setting of the parable of the lost sheep.

According to first-century Judaism, repentance had three elements. First, someone had to confess their sins. Second, they had to make compensation for their sins. Third, they had to demonstrate their sincerity that they wouldn't do it again. The religious leaders were threatened by Jesus because he accepted people before they changed their behavior - before they "repented!"

Jesus' response? A simple, powerful story.

- "Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Doesn't he leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it?" (Luke 15:4, NIV)
- "...when he finds it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep.' (Luke 15:5-6, NIV)
- "I tell you that in the same way there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who do not need to repent." (Luke 15:7, NIV)
